# ALUMNA SPOTLIGHT: MULIJAH



Mulijah has a smile that lights up a room. It's contagious, you can't help but laugh and smile along with her. Mulijah is an upbeat, happy person overall.

Her life has not always given her a lot to smile about in the past. Struggles with sobriety, and not having enough of a positive support network in her life, resulted in job loss and housing insecurity. She worked hard, and was doing well for several years. Then, the disease of addiction caught up with her again.

"I relapsed last year and ended up homeless. I went to rehab and came to Fresh Start afterwards to get back on my feet. This is the most perfect place ever, where I can ever start my life over again."

While at Fresh Start, Mulijah worked on her sobriety. She's someone who is always helping others. This has often lead to people taking advantage of her kindness. While at Fresh Start, she was encouraged to focus on herself, and to build a stronger network of supportive people. A network of positive people with whom she could set boundaries.

### "You help us get our lives back together."

"This is the best place to come. This is just perfect because we can learn to take care of ourselves. You aren't doing everything thing for us. We pay our way here, just like on the outside community. You help us save money. I I like everything about Fresh Start. I appreciate every single thing that's been given to me. My goal is to stay sober. That's my problem. If I can do that, then I won't have any other issues as far as living situations, work, or taking care of myself."

Mulijah found a new job, saved money, and moved into her own apartment. She continues to work with Fresh Start through our community services, which provides ongoing support after a participant leaves the shelter. What's her goal for Fresh Start? "I wish that Fresh Start will never go out of business. I wish that you get bigger, so that more women could come here."

Mulijah works to focus on the positive, on the good things around herself. She looks for things that will make her smile. In doing so, she is a cheerful positive force in her own life and in the lives of others around her. Now, that smile is shining even more brightly.

# **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

## **Residential Shelter Services**

The core service of Fresh Start is to provide a safe, secure, and positive home environment where women can change their lives. Residents develop an individualized goal plan with a case manager who then advocates for them, holds them accountable, and celebrates successes with them. Staff is on-site 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, to provide assistance and support.

In 2022, the challenges faced, including those that caused or contributed to their homelessness included substance use (90%), mental health (84%), legal issues/reentry (66%), and domestic violence (56%). There were several (14%) who received disability. The COIVD-19 pandemic continued to impact the program throughout the year in regards to both occupancy and groups and classes. Fresh Start continued to persevere and adapt. One on one services were available and staff remained dedicated to providing support, guidance, and assistance to women working to better their lives and become independent again.



## **Community Support Services**

Community Support is offered to residents who successfully complete the residential program. This service involves ongoing support which includes monthly home visits, continued goal planning and assistance, baskets of food and household supplies, and telephone support. In 2022, 8 women participated.




The Daisy celebrated 15 years of operation in 2022. The shop is completely run by volunteers, including shop managers Cindy Piester and Karen Lenzen. Thousands of hours have been provided by these two, and many other volunteers, since the store first opened in August 2017. Just in 2022 alone, volunteers donated 2,244 hours of their time.

In 2022, The Daisy raised \$48,930 through shop sales, consignment, and events. Since it opened, the Daisy has raised \$534,777 for Fresh Start! Expenses (not including sales tax) have been just \$23,871.

# **Fiscal Notes**

Per person and per meal costs have been higher over the past few years. This primarily is attributed to reduced occupancy due to the COVID-19 pandemic health and safety measures. While occupancy was lower, many of the expenses remained the same (i.e. staffing) or increased (i.e. food costs). The cost per person per day in 2019 was \$75, in 2022 it was \$97. The monthly cost per person for food in 2019 was \$2,260 and in 2022 it was \$2,943.

Goals for 2022, included to maintain a three month operating reserve and also to address necessary equipment upgrades. Upgrades and renovations will continue to be a goal for 2023.
